OUR RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

Politics

Gendered Crooks: Gender, Revolving Doors, and Voter Tolerance of Corruption – Sina Smid with M. Justesen (Copenhagen Business School) and A. Alexander (University of Gothenburg)

Key points:

- · This paper examines the effect of gender on voter perceptions of political candidates with ties to corrupt firms.
- We depart from assumptions that voters perceive women as inherently more honest than men and as outsiders to corrupt networks.
- We test these assumptions using a conjoint survey experiment in Brazil in 2021.
- Contrary to widespread expectations, we find that voters, regardless of their gender, prefer female over male mayoral candidates even when both are connected to corrupt firms.
- This preference for female candidates varies based on female representation in politics.
- Voters in municipalities with higher female political representation express lower support for female candidates relative to municipalities with no female representation.

From Voters to Politicians: The Vanishing Gender Gap in Preferences – Ximena Caló, Paola Profeta with R. Puglisi (University of Pavia), S. Scabrosetti (University of Pavia)

Key points:

- In a representative democracy, the extent to which gender-specific policy preferences are transmitted through the stages of political selection is relevant for assessing the substantive quality of representation.
- Using cross-sectional data from the European Social Survey (ESS) and the Comparative Candidate Survey (CCS), we explore gender gaps in policy preferences among individuals, political candidates, and elected officials.
- We find that, while gender gaps in policy preferences among voters are substantial, they shrink among candidates and become even less pronounced among elected officials.
- The dominant pattern is one of convergence, with female politicians aligned with male positions.
- Yet, gender gaps among politicians persist on identity-related issues, such as same-sex rights. These patterns hold irrespective of political ideology.

Policies

Subjective Survival Beliefs, Cognitive Skills and Investments in Risky Assets – Francesco Maura with C. Dal Bianco (University of Padova), F. Parodi (University of Milan), and G. Weber (University of Padova)

Key points:

- 50+ individuals tend to underestimate their life horizons, especially women. Thus, their (perceived) investment horizon is shorter.
- · We show that higher inaccuracy of survival expectations (i.e., more underestimation) reduces household's stock market participation.
- We want to use a structural approach to run counterfactual experiments of potential policy interventions related to reduction of stock market participation costs (financial literacy) and reduction of survival underestimation (longevity literacy).
- Women should benefit more from these interventions because of their lower financial literacy and higher survivorship underestimation.

Francesco Maura, Post-doctoral Researcher at the Lab, presented his work at EEA 2025 and the Lisbon Macro Workshop.

Education

Gender Composition and University Climate – Paola Profeta with S. Griselda (Atlassian) and G. Savio (University of Turin)

Key points:

- The university climate is an essential factor that influences students' academic outcomes and career trajectories.
- Traditional masculinity norms, particularly prevalent in male-dominated fields, can pose substantial barriers to success, especially for
 female students.
- This paper first measures students' adherence to masculinity norms, their anxiety levels, and their confidence in their academic

performance relative to peers.

- Second, we explore how these factors correlate with and predict academic performance and future career aspirations.
- Finally, leveraging the random assignment of students into different class groups within the same course at an elite university, we examine how peer gender composition influences students' masculinity norms, anxiety levels, academic confidence, and exam performance.
- Our findings demonstrate that increased exposure to female peers reduces adherence to traditional masculinity norms and anxiety, while enhancing students' confidence and academic outcomes.

Paola Profeta, Director of the Lab, presented her work at SIEP annual conference in Naples.

- Congratulations to Kenza Elass, Post-doctoral Researcher at the Lab, for <u>winning</u> the 2025 Etta Chiuri Prize for her JMP, awarded by the Società Italiana di Economia Pubblica (SIEP), the Associazione Italiana Economia del Lavoro (AIEL), the Centre for Household, Income, Labour and Demographic Economics (CHILD) and CSEF at the University of Naples Federico II.
